Welcome

to our Christingle Carol Service.

The word 'Christingle' means Christ-light, and the tradition originated in the Moravian Church in 1747. There are a number of symbols associated with the Christingle which will be explained during the service but the predominant theme is:

Christ, the light of the world.

The Christingle consists of:

- an orange representing the world with
- a red ribbon around it representing the blood of Jesus (i.e. his death on the cross for our sins),
- sweets skewered on 4 cocktail sticks which are pushed into the orange representing the fruits of the earth and the four seasons
- a lighted candle is pushed into the centre of the orange representing Jesus Christ, the light of the world. Jesus describes himself in the Bible, in John chapter 8 v. 12, in this way: 'I am the Light of the World, if you follow me you won't have to walk in darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life' (New Living Translation)
- and, in some services, as we do here, tin foil around the base of the candle to reflect Christ's light and goodness

The Jesse Tree

The Jesse Tree shows Jesus' family tree. Today, we are putting the symbols for two weeks on the tree: a shepherd's crook and harp for David, a stone altar for Elijah, an empty tent for Hezekiah, a fire tongs with a hot coal for Isaiah, tears for Jeremiah, a stone watch tower for Habakkuk and a city wall for Nehemiah, a scallop shell for John the Baptist, a white lily for Mary, a mother and child for Elizabeth, a pencil and tablet for Zechariah, a carpenter's square and hammer for Joseph, and a star for the Wisemen.



The Lighting of the Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath, or Advent crown, is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the

liturgical calendar of the Western church.
The Advent Wreath is traditionally a
Lutheran practice, albeit it has spread to
many other Christian denominations.
It is usually a horizontal evergreen wreath
with four candles and often, a fifth, white
candle in the centre. Beginning with the
First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a
candle can be accompanied by a Bible
reading and prayers. An additional candle
is lit during each subsequent week until, by
the last Sunday before Christmas, all four
candles are lit. Some Advent wreaths
include a fifth, white "Christ" candle which
can be lit at Christmas.

4 candles are lit on the Advent Wreath.

We light the fourth candle of Advent for Mary and for all God-bearers, saying 'yes' to God's challenge, accepting the pain and joy of an unknown future.

God, as we wait for your promise, give light, give hope.

The Reading - Matthew 1: 18-25

(International Children's Bible Version)

The reading is from the gospel of Matthew, chapter 1, verses 18 to 25.

18 The mother of Jesus Christ was Mary. And this is how the birth of Jesus came about. Mary was engaged to marry Joseph. But before they married, she learned that she was going to have a baby. She was pregnant by the power of the Holy Spirit. 19 Mary's husband, Joseph, was a good man. He did not want to disgrace her in public, so he planned to divorce her secretly.

²⁰ While Joseph thought about this, an angel of the Lord came to him in a dream. The angel said, "Joseph, descendant of David, don't be afraid to take Mary as your wife. The baby in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹ She will give birth to a son. You will name the son Jesus.^[a] Give him that name because he will save his people from their sins."

²² All this happened to make clear the full meaning of what the Lord had said through the prophet: ²³ "The virgin will be pregnant. She will have a son, and they will name him Immanuel." [b] This name means "God is with us."

²⁴ When Joseph woke up, he did what the Lord's angel had told him to do. Joseph married Mary. ²⁵ But he did not have intimate relations with her until she gave birth to the son. And Joseph named the son Jesus.

The Orange

The orange represents the world; the world held lovingly in God's hands, from the beginning of time, and every day and night until God's work is done.

The Red Ribbon

The red ribbon represents Jesus Christ giving his life for the world. In the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, we see God loving the world and changing people's lives for good.

The Fruits or Jellytots

Through bread and wine made from the fruits of the earth, Jesus showed us how he would save us. Through food and drink, God has always shown people how he loves them.

The Tin Foil

The tin foil around the base of the candle reflects Christ's light and goodness. We too can reflect the light of Christ and make it brighter, by caring for others.

The Candle

The candle represents Christ, who is the light of the world.

Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness.

The light cannot be put out.

We have come from the east, the north, the west and the south. And together we ask that the light that we search for may light our way in love, this day, this Christmas and in the days to come. Amen.
